
Mary O'Connor An Interview conducted by Hyoyang Song

H: What influenced you to study photography at college?

M: My art teacher in high school. She really influenced me during that time of my life and I looked up to her. She inspired me to create without being afraid of people's interpretations of my art.



H: Why do you photograph? The main reason you are photographing?
M: I photograph because it allows me to capture my emotions or experience in life at a certain time. I'm interested in how images can keep the memory of someone alive or let me experience a moment in history.



H: Where do you get artistic inspiration? Are there any other forms of art you practice? M: I've recently been inspired by my grandfather's photographs. He took amazing photographs throughout his life that have greatly inspired and shaped my work to be what it is today.

H: What do you photograph normally and why do you decide to photograph them?
M: I've photographed scenes around me that are significant in some way, such as self-portraits-, and members of my family. Religious iconography is also an important part of my work.



H: How did you use photography in your life? What do you want to say to starting college students about photography?

H: Whose photographic style do you admire the most?

M: I was always inspired by Vivian Maier's work, ever since I saw the documentary on her. I think I was drawn to the mysterious aspects of her work as well as her personal life not on camera.



H: Did that artist influence your work?

M: Yes, I remember making work greatly influenced by her when I first arrived at MassArt. I used a medium format camera, a Rolleiflex to be exact. I took a lot of pictures of my shadow, that's for sure.

H: What other projects do you want to start in the near future or far in the future? What do you want to say through photographs?

M: I don't really know what I plan to do in the future. I think that's one of the exciting and appealing things about art. You never know what direction you'll go in the future or what will inspire you down the road.

H: Has coronavirus affected your photography career?

M: I would say yes. When news of the pandemic started to blow up everywhere on the news, I began to sift through my old family photos and my grandfather's photos. I had never really thought much about appropriated imagery until then.
